

EWGA GREATER TORONTO AREA CHAPTER MENTEE GUIDE

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AS A MENTEE?

1. Have a “get to know you” meeting with your Mentor in a setting where you are not playing golf. This meeting could be over lunch, cocktails or just an opportunity to sit down and talk. This meeting can be at a golf course or anywhere else that is comfortable and convenient for participants.
2. Play golf together and review the items on the mentoring checklist. This is your opportunity to learn how to get around a golf course in a safe, supportive learning environment! This can be any number of holes of golf, even if it is less than 9 holes. The Mentoring Checklist outlines the items that should be covered during this round of golf.
3. Play golf a second time together. This can be in any setting that is mutually agreeable. Some suggestions include:
 - Play 9, 18 or even less than 9 holes (for instance, a few holes at twilight) at the golf course of your choice
 - Play in an EWGA new golfer outing or event together
 - If your Chapter holds a mentoring event, play golf together in the Mentoring event
 - Play in a casual scramble event
 - Play golf at an Executive or Par-3 course
4. Ask your Mentor to help you identify EWGA activities you may wish to be involved in and navigate the process of signing up for those activities.
5. Have the opportunity to ask questions by phone and/or email to answer questions about the EWGA or about golf.
6. Complete an online program evaluation survey and submit to the Association. Mentee’s will be sent an email with details on how to complete the survey. Mentor’s will also be asked to fill out an evaluation survey.

MENTEE QUALIFICATIONS

1. Have completed a program of basic golf instruction. This may be through EWGA, such as EWGA Link Up 2 Golf or new golfer clinics, or outside of EWGA. Your Mentor will not provide information on how to swing a golf club or execute the technical skills involved in playing the game. Rather, they are there to help you get around the golf course safely and answer questions about basic rules and etiquette and the other nuances of the game in order to build your confidence and comfort in the golf course setting.
2. Be willing to ask questions and receive advice and feedback from the Mentor.
